From time to time I hear comments about how we compare with other places in the area, or yacht clubs in general. when you visit the Club: if you've enjoyed what you have been served, please tell your friends but if you haven't, please tell us, at the earliest opportunity.

Price comparisons can be misleading. For example, I have been told that at another club, Ringwood Bitter is 20p cheaper and it almost always turns out to be Ringwood Best that the Member saw elsewhere; we serve Ringwood 49er, a premium beer that simply costs more. You'll also see 'loss leader' prices around the town, particularly for roasts. We don't go in for that sort of thing: our beef is best sirloin and all our prices are set to produce the same level of contribution to the Club's funds which, of course, go to the betterment of the Club. We do our best to look at ways to be more efficient and to increase the transparency of our financial performance. In a recent survey of the menus of six pubs and restaurants with a reputation for food in the area, our prices were 16% cheaper when comparing a dozen or so prices for starters, main courses and desserts. We weren't cheaper on all dishes but we were on the great majority.

Dining Room & River Room
Open All Day on Fridays and Saturdays

## MEMBER'S CARDS

For nearly 10 years the design on the face of Members cards has been unchanged. However, advancing technology meant that we needed to produce a new master that could be digitally reproduced. That gave us the opportunity to change the picture, as we paid a reasonably heavy licence fee to use the wave image. We will soon be producing new cards that will show the Clubhouse, using one of the pictures from the web site as the 'master'. That helps with a consistent 'image', and as we own the copyright, there is no licence fee to pay.

The new card will come in three versions, each with a different coloured border:

Blue for Full and Family members over 18

*Red* for Provisional Members (so that staff and Committee Members know to help with introductions)

White for Juniors and Family Members under 18, so that we can be seen to meet licensing requirements to prevent under-age drinking.

We will issue the new cards to newly joining Members, and to youngsters straight away. For all existing Members, other than Provisional Members, the new style card will be issued as a replacement if a current card breaks, is worn out or lost.
