#### LYMINGTON XOD SAILING

Stuart Jardine extended his record of X One Design Captain's Cup wins at Cowes Week to eight spanning an incredible 54 years. First winning the trophy in 1956 with Ado and Jane Pitt-Pitts at the age of 22, Stuart came back into the class in the late nineties and has since won at Cowes Week another seven times. This year Stuart was crewed by his son Mark and long-time crew (and now seven time Captain's Cup winner himself) Christian Brewer.

It was a fantastic week for the class with 80 XODs racing – the largest fleet at Cowes Week by a huge margin. The number of Olympic, World, European and National champions from other sailing classes increases year on year. Double Olympic gold medallist Sarah Webb took part in the racing in *Myrtle* and is already hooked on the class.

Lymington sailors had a hugely successful week taking four of the top six positions overall. Adrian Summers, Ian Paton and Warren Cloate in *Excalibur* contended for the title right to the last race to finish third overall, Stephen Whiteman in *Julia* finished fourth and Ado Jardine in *Lucrezia* came in sixth. These performances were enough for Lymington to win the Phillipson Challenge Shield for top division in the XOD class.

At Lymington the Annual Junior Helms race had six entries. This is an opportunity for the Club's junior sailors (under 18) to race in an XOD for the Sir Arthur McDonald Trophy. The event was won by 16 year old Victoria O'Callaghan in *Mersa*, second was Oly Reeve also 16 in *Red Coral*, with

Folkert Schepers 18 years old in *Waverley* third. Well done to all those who took part.

Presently the local Saturday points series is being led by Ado Jardine from his brother Stuart with William Norris in third and on Wednesdays Stuart is leading Ado jointly with Eric Williams/Rory Paton.

#### **RS ELITES**

Seven Elites competed in the Late Thursday Evening series, which was won by Martin and Amanda Wadhams.

Another new boat has been ordered for delivery in September, bringing the Lymington fleet up to 8 boats. At least three other Members are understood to be seriously considering buying boats, so prospects for a much enlarged fleet for next season are looking very good.

Six sailors from the Wednesday Junior Sailing programme have now had experience of sailing *Freebie*, the Club's own Elite. Conditions for this were very windy, too much so to risk using the spinnaker, but some thrilling two-sail reaches gave a good idea of the excitement that Elites can offer, and everyone thoroughly enjoyed the day. The fleet captain, who sailed with them, was very impressed by how quickly these young sailors adapted to a boat that is quite different from anything that most of them had sailed before.

Freebie is still available for charter by Members, or at slightly higher rates by non-members, for the Equinox Regatta on September 26/27th, and for most races of the Solent Circuit Winter Series.

## **YOUTH AND JUNIORS**

Laser 4.7



Tom Britz won the 2009 Junior European Laser 4.7 Championship in Helsinki. Sailors from 25 countries participated in this year's championships with the boys' class of 148 sailors ranging in age from 13 to 17 years. Tom sailed consistently all week, notching up 5 top ten results of the 6 races to count taking Bronze position in the overall event and claiming the U16 Junior European title. Other Club sailors' results were James Parker-Mowbray (27th silver fleet), Jamie Diamond (33rd silver fleet) and Ollie Cooper (65th gold fleet).

# Lymington 420 sailors

Plymouth's Mount Batten Centre hosted this year's International 420 Class National Championships from 23rd to 28th August. Seven teams from the Club took part, together with several other Club Members joining other crews. The Lymington sailors arrived two days early and had some training, which proved useful as the big rolling seas were very different to their usual sailing area in the Solent!

The race area in Plymouth Sound, seaward of the breakwater, provided challenging and exciting racing, but unfortunately only three out of five days racing was held due to 30 knot winds and very big seas on Wednesday & Friday. The usual social activities compensated for some lost days.

# Rolex Fastnet 2009

Congratulations to David Lees in *Hephzibah* who won Class 3 IRC and the Iolaire Cup this year and wrote the following.

From the first race of the season we knew we had a battle on our hands with the French Nicholson 33 *Iromiguy*. Up to the Fastnet race we had traded 1st and 2nd's with her in every race but she was leading us on points in Class 3. The team's view was that they were prepared to carry *Hephzibah* to the rock and back if that was what was required to beat *Iromiguy*.

We chose the Squadron end to start and my son Mark produce an immaculate start that had us away in clear air down the island shore with the light kite. All change at Yarmouth where we started beating in light winds. It stayed

light and tricky past Anvil Point and by midnight we were anchored near the Shambles. A gentle breeze filled in about 2am but the anchor was fouled on something very solid. We struggled for half an hour with little success and were about to let it all go when we released 30 metres of line in a hurry, the bow shot up 4ft and we were free and still had the anchor.

We went south whilst we saw a lot of boats going north to get round Portland Bill on the first of the west going tide. The fleet came together again at Start Point, we were in the leading pack and from there we kept moving all the way to the Fastnet Rock, whilst certainly some of the others found some sizeable holes in which to contemplate the delights of offshore racing.

At the Rock at 7pm on Wednesday we were 4th or 5th in the Class on the tracker and there looked to be very little wind overnight on the rhumb line to the Scillies, so we headed due south on a quick angle for the kite. It was very lonely as we didn't see a single boat for nearly 24 hours. Thursday morning it got progressively lighter but by late afternoon we were freed and back to a kite for the final 24 hours to Plymouth.

Most opinion seems to be that it was not a vintage Fastnet – rather grey and damp but for us it was just about as good as it gets.

(Iromiguy was 8th in class on the Fastnet and Hephzibah is now leading the series)

#### **MEASURING UP CAMPAIGN**

RNLI have started the RNLI Bembridge Lifeboat Appeal. This is to raise money towards an updated and rebuilt lifeboat station and a new Tamar Class lifeboat. The appeal seeks to raise  $\mathfrak{L}1m$  towards overall costs in excess of  $\mathfrak{L}10m$ .

The appeal asks all sailors in the Solent area to contribute £1 per foot of boat length; £50 will get you a burgee. RNLI is one of the two charities that the Club supports and this seems to me to be a worthwhile cause, although I recognize that many of you already actively support the RNLI through Offshore, Governors, or other programmes.
