Improvements to the Club Audio System

Six new loudspeakers have been installed covering the Balcony, Forecourt and Pontoons. Race Officers and Event Organisers can now brief competitors, make general announcement and even have prizegivings, using a new radio microphone, anywhere outside.

Inside the Club, controls are now in place in the Library and Bar/River Room area giving the ability to make individual announcements to each of the separate loudspeaker zones at the same time. This means it is now possible to brief competitors on the Forecourt, run a lecture in the Library and make a Bar announcement simultaneously.

All areas have enhanced volume control facilities; we have two extra radio microphones and can even use MP3 players!

If you are running an event inside or outside the Club, please ensure you are fully briefed in good time about what is now available.

Last year we installed a new High Definition Video Projector with an HD satellite tuner and laptop playback facilities in the Library. Many will remember that this was used to view our Olympians' triumphs in China.

XOD'S

Lymington team leads New Build XOD Project

The approved method of building an XOD and the timbers specified have remained in place since 1911 and the labour intensive construction and costs of specified timbers have combined to make a new build too expensive for most to consider. A team based on Lymington undertook a year ago to investigate whether a modern way of constructing an XOD could be found and suitable timbers sorted out so that the class could enter its second century of competitive racing with a genuine prospect of a few new boats being built each year to replace and enhance the class. GRP was considered but rejected due to the very high setting up costs, one builder implications and the view of most owners that as a classic class the main structure should remain in wood.

The team visited a number of timber suppliers and boat builders to seek information and David Alan-Williams agreed to look at the X drawings and help the team. It very quickly became apparent that not only the long build time but also with many types of timber becoming endangered species the timber to use would be an important aspect. Following discussions with senior members of the XOD class the decision was made that for the project to succeed a demonstration boat had to be built and Ado Jardine agreed to head up an amateur building team. In order to raise sufficient funds we decided to issue £250 shares to those who wished to support the project and this enabled the building work to start in earnest on 5th January 2009.

Last October the team came to a decision that 'Fast Strip', a Tongue and Grooved strip planking system, should be used which would save many man hours in construction time and that the timbers to use should be Canadian Douglas Fir for the planking and Iroko for all the hardwood areas. The whole boat will be fastened by Epoxy and strengthened by use of glass fibre all of which Wessex

Resins are generously sponsoring by supplying all the resins and glass materials required as well as helping with technical advice. Steve Etheridge has very kindly sponsored the project with space within his boatshed and continuing technical help and advice as the project proceeds.

In addition to seeking to build an X that will have a racing life of some 100 years, as is the case with a handful of boats built in 1911 we are looking to reduce the annual maintenance costs/time, to a similar figure as a GRP craft. We expect that not only will this strip plank build and digitised drawings enable boat builders to produce XOD's at a competitive price, compared to other racing craft of this size, but have the added bonus that DIY enthusiasts will be able to build hulls accurately and relatively easily.

By the middle of February the hull had been fully planked



up with a laminated stem and Iroko keel, shaped and fitted. The intention is to have varnished topsides on this boat to show the timber construction and therefore great care is being taken to prepare the woodwork particularly the glass / epoxy on the topsides because no screws or fillers can be used. The plan is to completely finish the outside of the hull before turning her over and completing the interior and deck work. To reduce future maintenance to a minimum the whole boat will be glass and epoxy covered and built in buoyancy tanks will be introduced.

The intention throughout is to simplify and modernise the construction work required to produce a new hull and deck whilst at the same time being able to finish this one-off demonstration yacht at minimum cost. We have sought and obtained an iron keel, rudder, mast, sails and a good selection of fittings which we hope will enable us to get the boat on the water for well under £10,000. The boat will be ready to turn over by the time this report is published and she will be ready to launch towards the end of April, in time for the start of the Lymington 2009 XOD racing programme.

David Harris will be the boat's guardian and oversee the 2009 racing programme, we hope she will be raced in every XOD Club event. Priority will be given to the project share holders when allocating crews but we hope all interested in one-design racing will join in. We welcome younger Club sailors and other dinghy and small boat owners to join in the fun, which of course will be free! Details will be published on the Club boards and website regarding how to get involved on the water.

Lymington Lifeboat 10km Run, May 10th, 2009

The 8th Lymington Lifeboat 10k Run will start at 10.00 am on Sunday 10th May, starting and finishing in Woodside Park. Last year the 623 competitors enjoyed glorious weather and the same has been requested for this year, with the entry limit now raised to 700 runners. The course provides spectacular views across the Solent. The route goes along Lower Pennington Lane, the gravel track to the sea wall at Keyhaven, along to the sea wall, up to Oxey Barn to the finish in Woodside Park.

All finishers receive a medal, there are cups and prizes for the first three men and women and first veterans. Donations cover the expenses of the run so all entry fees and sponsorship goes to the Lymington.RNLI Over £50,000 has been raised so far and the lifeboat crew would like to thank everyone for their continuing support.
