Members can help the Club by encouraging other family members, sailing friends and crew to apply for and enjoy the benefits of membership.

Finally, we have a packed and exciting programme of sailing events this season and whatever the weather throws at us, I hope you enjoy a wonderful year on the water.

The new Members system is entirely independent of the office system, in order to comply with the bank's security instructions. Our membership records management system is also in need of an overhaul. The current company will cease to support it in November, so we have no option but to consider alternatives. This work is in progress thanks to an expert volunteer Member and office support and will be reported on in a month or two's time.

# New Kitchen finished a week early - in time for Easter



The wait is over: at lunchtime on Friday 22nd March, after five weeks' hard work by the contractor and Club Project team, the newly refurbished kitchen was handed over. When the old equipment was removed, the oldest piece was found to date from 1948 - they made it to last in those days! A small amount of asbestos was found under the plate protecting the floor from the heavy cookers and this was safely removed by a specialist contractor.

In order to improve the chef's workflow and in response to advice given by the Environmental Health officer, the kitchen has been reorganised as well as re-equiped. The walls are now 'wipe clean' hygienic plastic, the floor has been replaced with industry

standard 'Altro' and there is a new suspended ceiling with cleanable tiles. The old aluminium cooker hood has been replaced with a stainless steel unit, and to comply with current regulations, the gas and extract system have safety interlocks.

The IN/OUT door is now near the River Room and the servery is now contained within the kitchen. Washing up and waste disposal operations are well away from the food preparation areas. The two new portable carvery units which have done sterling service during the shutdown have been put to their proper place.

The House Manager's desk and till have moved to the dining room and the salad bar which was finished a few weeks ago has now returned to its normal function.

To complete the job, there is a simpler system of ordering food. At lunchtimes, order and pay for hot or cold food at the bar; your order will be sent electronically to the salad bar and kitchen and food will be delivered to your table. In the evening, your order will be taken by

staff and you will be invited to your table when it is ready. Drinks may also be ordered and served at your table. Different arrangements will be put in place for very busy periods and Thursday Night Racing catering.



On April 6th at 1800, there will be an official opening and kitchen launch party sponsored by Lockharts, the contractors, All are welcome. A big thank you to Members for their support of the Club during the disruption. The result is well worth the wait.

# Cruising - Past Events Royal Southampton YC - 14th/15 March

The weather forecast was not good all week so three hardy yachts and one motor boat left for Southampton on a very cold and windless Thursday. On the Friday morning the motor boat left at 6.30 am to get home before the forecast gale arrived. The three yachts left at 11.30 am to catch the ride only to find the wind blowing from the south west at 30 to 40 knots. This a made for an uncomfortable ride back to Lymington but overall a very good meet despite the weather.

#### Safety Morning - Saturday 16 March

Over 50 people from the Club and the LTSC attended the fifth annual Safety Morning. Robin Pratt started proceedings with a talk on distress calls and a briefing on AIS and its future developments. This was followed by tips for engine maintenance given by Clive Rochfort; put over the topic in a very simplistic manner so even the most non - technical of us could understand. Simon Bush then appeared with a fantastic team of young Sea Cadets to cover first aid – the first five minutes. After a short talk, the dummies appeared and Members were seen on all fours trying the resuscitation techniques supervised by the Sea Cadets. Finally a joint team from Ocean Safety and Harken gave a presentation on safety equipment and MOB. This included an inflation of both life jackets and a life raft plus the attempt to eat some very unsavory emergency ration biscuits.

Overall a successful and enjoyable morning, which achieved its aim of reminding Members at the beginning of the season how to use rarely, if ever, used safety equipment and the procedures associated with such kit. Another session will be run next year – so watch this space!

#### Newtown Anchorage Update

Firstly a big thank you to the many Members who made their views on Newtown Anchorage very clear when replying to the DEFRA consultation paper on Marine Conservation Zones (MCZs). You have had a considerable impact on Government thinking. On Monday 25th March Jeremy Vine, Philip Gossage, Jack McPhie from the LTSC and I attended a packed public meeting in Newport which was addressed by the Minister for Natural Environment and Fisheries at the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs, Richard Benyon MP. The minister had been briefed by Peter Hebbard who accompanied the minister to the meeting.

Representatives of divers, fishermen, marine biologists and sailors presented reasoned and cogent points against the current proposals. It was clear from the minister's presentation and his responses to the questions put to him that there will be a full re-examination of the way that MCZs are managed. The government have said they will consider each site individually. If voluntary bodies in conjunction with local interests and harbour authorities can agree how to manage an MCZ then the government may take this into consideration too. The consultation period is over. We now have to wait until the results are published. We can't say that we have achieved the objective of keeping the moorings and anchorage in Newtown open to sailors yet but we have shown that we have a reasonable case and we believe that the government is listening to it.

John Pockett, the RYA Southern Region representative with responsibility for Marine Conservation Zones in and around the Solent, had a private discussion with the Minister before the meeting. There was favourable media coverage of the meeting on BBC South. As soon as there is any further news the General Committee and Members will be briefed accordingly.

"Race Pace" was the title of the fourth Lymington winter training weekend, led by Greg Carey and his team of fellow Oppie legends. Again conditions were at best mixed and challenging for the 48 sailors, whose characters have been so heavily formed this winter that they

hardly need gloves, protective clothes or boats.

The 2013 Team Winner/P&B/Zhik was announced and two of the three team members are from Lymington; George Ford and Vita Heathcote. Vita was invited to Faaborg in Denmark to visit the Winner factory to see how they are built, be presented with her brand new jazzed up oppie and to train with the rest of the Winner Team (see picture right).

Winter reinforced its grip for the Spring Championships on Mersea Island. 140+ sailors were treated to arctic conditions and a spring tide. Lymington sailors are by now quite used to sailing in near-survival conditions on the open sea and this showed in the results with eight of them (four

girls and four boys) coming in the top 14. The last of the non-squad winter training sessions took place at Spinnaker Sailing Club. This training is designed for the fledgling sailors and is the perfect step between the Salterns and the Lymington River. Joint winners from the series were Hector Bennett and Henry Heathcote (both RLymYC).

The South Zone squad trained at Oxford and Weymouth this month. It's a bit like the inter-house rugby matches at school, with bodies being laid on the line like never before. With the Worlds and European Teams Selection Trials coming up shortly, this also gave the sailors the chance to test how sharp their elbows had become after a hard winter's training; Milo Gill-Taylor won the event with fellow Lymington sailor Max Moyles second.
