2011 Racing Charts and Designators

The updated charts for 2011 are now available from the website and the office. There have been a couple of changes: 'heart' has now become K and 10A has now become B1 which is the post on the end of the rock breakwater. Also on the website you will find a link to the new SCRA designator system. I have worked with SCRA over the winter to ensure our marks are aligned with the new system. The Western end of the Solent is in Zone 2 but the Western Solent clubs will still continue to use our single digit designators which is the second character: for example, Hurst under SCRA is 2A, for our racing we will use A.

There are 5 new larger dinghy marks to replace those which were stolen last year and we are pleased to report that Ropewalk Marine, Nick Cox Chandlery and Towergate Mardon will be sponsoring 3 of them.

Cruising Dinner

We had a very enjoyable and well attended evening, with 91 Members and guests present. Our speaker, David Evans, Marine Director and Harbour Master at the River Hamble, entertained us with with a light hearted illustrated talk on his work in the Hamble. This year we altered the format of the Cruising Dinner to give greater prominence to the award of the cruising trophies. One of the reasons we awarded the trophies before dinner was that for the first time since 1992, the Junior Brownlow Cup for the best log submitted by a Junior or Family Member under the age of 15 was awarded. Last summer a fleet of Optimists helmed by children aged between 7 and 12 years old sailed from Lymington to Weymouth in an organised cruise over several days on their way to the Optimist National Championships. All but one of them were present to receive the trophy and their Club glasses inscribed "Jurassic Oppies".

The other trophy awards were:-

Cadiz Cup. Richard and Celia Lassen for the log of their cruise on Oestara from Bucklers Hard, non stop around the west of Ireland to the Faroe Islands, then to the Orkney Islands and back via Inverness, the Clyde Estuary and the west coast, returning to Buckers Hard.

- Quains Cup. Alan and Penny Spriggs for their passage in Pennypincher from Lymington to Levkas.
- Senior Brownlow Cup. Likengkeng Sergeaunt for her log of the passage with her husband David in Acquaholic from Lymington to Oslo via France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Germany, Denmark and Sweden
- XII Bar Blues Trophy. Neal and Miggy Flux for the blog of their 5 year project sailing from Lymington to the Eastern Mediterreanean, visiting 12 countries on the way.
- Seamanship Trophy. Andrew Wilkes and Maire Breathnach for their voyage from Lymington through the North West Passage to Alaska. Prior to their voyage only 93 boats had traversed the Passage since it was first achieved in 1903/05. It was a feat of seamanship well worthy of the award.
- John and Angie Bailey Trophy for Lifetime Achievement.
- George Tinley for his contribution to the life of the Club both on and off the water over the 44 years he has been a Member and for his contribution to the wider interests of sailing.

House

House Questionnaire

In November we asked Members to comment on the first floor activities in the Clubhouse. Many thanks to the 374 of you who were kind enough to respond.

- 75% of the responses came from Members who were in the 65 years and over age bracket.
- 50% of those responding use the Club bar/restaurant once or twice a month and 15% are frequent users.
- Overall, 85% rated the quality of food as good or excellent, but in the case of under 65's this dropped to 58%.
- Overall 90% liked the choice of menu, but in the under 65's age group 75% liked the choice.
- 78% of respondents consider the restaurant provides fair value. However 22% of under 65's and 13% of over 65's consider prices too high compared to local eateries.
- The 'no comments' amounted to 6.5% of replies.

- 40 respondents had not always been able to get a table.
- Valuable specific comments made included:
- a) preferences for a more limited bar/restaurant menu, with more frequent changes, enabling a concentration on food quality.
- b) preferences for better quality and more varied vegetables.

c) more variety of fish on the menu, preferably fresh whenever possible.

The analysis of the replies has been extremely helpful to the House Committee in their planning for the future. The restaurant menus are being amended and will be out shortly.

House Projects

The Club is preparing itself for the sailing season and upgrading the facilities for Members. It is a little like painting the Forth Bridge – a never ending job in a Clubhouse as old as ours.

This year we have a particularly active programme.

- The Ladies Wet Room is nearly finished enabling lady sailors to change and shower in a much more pleasant environment.
- The Library is to have the south and east windows replaced with folding doors making the balcony almost an extension of the room perfect for the Club Regatta Summer Ball. Work begins on 21st March, but the external stairs to the Upper Terrace will be removed a week earlier.
- The new inner front door has now been installed. We have taken the opportunity to upgrade the Club Card technology from the now obsolete magnetic swipe cards to the latest proximity card system much like the Oystercards used by London Transport. In about a month, after an extensive period of testing, we will be issuing new Membership cards to everyone on a replacement basis. Once this has been done we will be able to implement better security measures within the

There were 238 entries, 60 different types of dinghy and 107 clubs represented at this hugely popular annual pursuit race on 8th January at Queen Mary reservoir. Just two dinghies represented the Club this year, and though not in the top 10 finishers, they both went away



with trophies. Katie Russell was first Lady in a Laser Radial, and Jeremy Vines the Grand Master (over 60s) in 'Rhapsody', a National 18. The Rhapsody crew being David Vines and Fran Gifford (the latter made waves last year by circumnavigating the UK in a 16ft Wayfarer, see www.fransbigadventure.com) The forecast was dire, the wind was whistling around the clubhouse and boats were blown off their trollies. However, 40 minutes into the race the wind quite suddenly dropped off by 10 knots or more, the sun came out and we had a glorious sail. The moderating breeze favoured the early starters. Nevertheless, an International 14 succeeded in reaching the front before the final whistle at 1430, and thus won overall. Others in the top 10 were a Graduate, 2 National 12s, 3 Merlins, a Fireball, a Laser 3000 and a Moth As ever, the organisation on and off water was immaculate - a real credit to QMSC.

Optimists

Congratulations to the Lymington sailors on their selection for the Irish Nationals this year. Of the 15 highest performing sailors aged 12 and under – that is effectively the British Junior Team, Lymington has produced 11 of the sailors. February has been mild so most of the sailors have been able to get out at least once a week. In the middle of the month we hosted a training regatta; 46 sailors registered for the weekend. Unfortunately the small matter of 40 knots cancelled the Sunday, but we had completed 8 races in magical conditions – 12-16 knots and warm! - the day before. National Squad sailors dominated the results, with Jenny Cropley and Milo Gill-Taylor not making too many mistakes.

An incredibly high standard of main fleet competitors at the Spinnaker Oppie Open saw the Lymington sailors having to work very hard for their tea. Terrific results from Jenny Cropley (2nd), Mimi el-Khazindar (5th), Milo Gill-Taylor (8th) and Vita Heathcote (9th) gave us a strong showing in very light, tricky conditions. The 46 strong regatta fleet was convincingly won by William Heathcote. Other results of note were Delfi Sesto, on her first every open meeting, putting in some great results. Also the two youngest sailors, Becky Cropley and Amos Sopher completing every race in very difficult conditions.

Laser 4.7

Gul Laser 4.7 European & World Qualifier Plus Ladder

Over the weekend of 26th/27th of February the Club ran the first of the qualifying series for this year's Laser 4.7 European and World events, which are to be held in the Netherlands and San Francisco respectively. The event attracted forty nine sailors, all between 11 and 17 years of age, who took to the water in some challenging conditions.



On Saturday the wind touched 28 knots in the gusts from the west and the fleet had some exciting tussles at the leeward mark. After winning two of the day's three races, Dan Bullock, from Burghfield SC and RLymYC, led the pack closely followed by Matthew Hall, and David Pain. By Sunday the wind had eased but shifted at times as much as 30 degrees as the showers went through, dying off to less than 6 knots in the afternoon. This did not thwart the race team led by Roger Wilson who managed to get in the two races on schedule.

Dan Bullock held on to his overnight lead to win on 11 points, followed by David Pain (Cardiff) on 16 points, with Ollie Sellers in third place on 18 points. First Girl was awarded to Megan O'Brian

(Hollowell), the Endeavour prize was won by Georgia Caws (Royal Victoria) and the Improver prize went to Matthew Hall (Spinnaker).

Lymington XOD Division - Centenary Year

In sheds and gardens all over the Forest and as far as the west country there has been much sanding, epoxy setting and varnishing and the preparations for a very special anniversary for the X One Design Class are almost completed. Xoanon XOD [N1] - 'New Build'Trials Continue in 2011

Launched at the end of June 2009 Xoanon is now about to start her 3rd season of appraisal. Thus far her performance within the Lymington Divisional fleet has been very much as expected, in general her results have matched the expertise of her crew. She appears a good average performer as her design and build team intended, whilst almost unnoticed she has a number of ideas incorporated that class members considered should be trialled. For instance she has, built in buoyancy tanks fore and aft, her rudder tube is glassfibre, there are no metal fastenings through the hull including no chainplates in her topsides [her rigging is taken directly to the foot of the mast and in addition glass cloth is an integral part of her Epoxy finish.

Reducing maintenance costs was high on the priority list when considering her build for although most class members considered wood must be the main construction material, protecting the wood over many years was vital and hence the Glass Epoxy finish. Her wood topsides seen through the glass clearly show her tongue and groove strip plank construction that enabled her team of amateur builders to build her so well. A full racing season in the Western Solent is being organised for 2011, with some top helmsmen who at present do not own an X being lined up to race her. Her 40 plus owners are keen that as wide a spectrum of Club sailors as possible, keen on racing, come and give her a trial. Cowes Week will not be on her calendar until the class officially accept her.

Bookings will be organised by <u>David Carslaw</u>, assisted by <u>Paul Rivers-Latham</u> who will keep all informed weekly on the XOD Divisional web site regarding bookings and/or crew requirements. Anyone wishing to

helm or crew this season but not a member of the Lymington Division should also contact David or Paul but helms need checking for insurance cover. Xoanon may be used by other competent helmsmen on non XOD racing days, again through David and Paul.
