Back in April our 24ft open Saltram launch We're Here, which had given 34 years of service to the Club as race support boat, mark laver and committee boat, was towed away to a new life as a fishing boat in Cork.

The new We're Here is a 7.9 metre catamaran, with twin Honda outboards, built to the Club's specification by Cheetah Marine on the Isle of Wight. She has an enclosed cabin, wc facilities, wheelchair access and is three times as fast as her predecessor, On Thursday 19 April Barry Smith, Phil Baker, Jon Chittock and project manager Michael Derrick were taken in the Club RIB Valiant to meet the new boat at the Needles. After some photographs with the Needles as a dramatic backdrop, the boat was taken to Yarmouth to complete the Maritime and Coastquard Agency coding inspection and was then driven to Lymington to take up her new role. In May Annie Littleiohn, a Member for 61 years. named the Club's new launch in front of a party of members and staff who had been involved in the selection and specification of the new boat. Annie broke the traditional bottle of champagne over the bow and wished good luck to We're Here and all who sail in her.

SOCIAL AND HOUSE NEWS

The House Committee have been focusing on three aspects of House during the past six months.

- 1. Infrastructure, looking at the development of the building, its maintenance and ongoing refurbishment.
- 2. The House programme for social events, catering and bar development (menu and wines) and the understanding of members needs
- 3. Service delivery to members, staffing and purchasing

INFRASTRUCTURE

Balcony Extension

Following the last AGM, when the balcony extension was approved, we invited three firms to tender against a closely defined specification, timescale and price guide.

After several iterations and negotiation, Dunford Construction Ltd was selected.

The work will commence mid October and complete early January, this schedule based on the least impact to Members.

The Bar

The second major infrastructure project related to the Bar. The current bar is tired having seen over 25 years of liquid service and is in need of substantial and urgent work.

For those interested in Club history, the following is an extract from the Club's 1947 Bulletin, when the first bar was created.

A gang of local Members headed by the Vice-Commodore and ably assisted by the Club Boatman, carried out a frontal attack on a walled partition which collapsed into a heap of rubble, and presently emerged as an up-to-date Bar with all modern conveniences including a fluorescent lighting effect which is reputed to have caused the Club Steward to resort to the make-up box.

How times, expectations and regulations have changed!

The aim is to replace the existing bar in the same overall 'footprint' and address some of the aesthetic and operational aspects. These include:

- Removing the unsightly grille shutters after closing time.
- Oak panelling the bar (in the style of the dining room), creating an attractive ambiance
- Improving the working space behind the bar to improve Members' service
- Removing the canopy over the bar to improve lighting and views from the River Room

The aim is to keep the look and feel of a traditional club bar, give better service access for members and staff and provide an environment that we can all be proud of.

We have received initial input and indicative costs from three suppliers and having selected a very experienced specialist bar designer, we are refining plans and obtaining quotes. The intent would be to have the new bar operational in February 2008 with a three-week work program commencing in January, subject of course to financial plans and budgets.

Maintenance

The Gents toilet refurbishment is complete and we have replaced windows in the front of the building. We will replace 'blown' double-glazing in the bar and river room and look at the refurbishment needs in the river room.

The ladies toilet vanitory unit needs replacing and the ladies shower room flooring needs tiling; the library needs freshening up and some kitchen appliances need replacing. All these items will be scheduled in line with available funds and according to our financial resources.

HOUSE PROGRAMME

Social Events

The winter social programme has been closely reviewed, keeping many of the favourites from last year whilst adding some new ideas.

We continue with Quiz and Bridge suppers but add a second bridge supper to include members with differing skill levels. The Jazz supper has altered to a music supper to cater for a wider choice of music.

Some of the new themes include for:

- St Andrews Day Lunch and Scotch tasting (30th October)
- St Georges Day 'Best of English' dinner based on finest English food
- Halloween supper
- Christmas Carols for the family (with Santa!)
- Tommy Cooper evening and dinner
- Three famous chefs menu dinner (limited to 40 people)
- Pancake Lunch (savoury and sweet)
- Two bridge suppers per month (for players at all levels)

The Club programme gives details of these and forthcoming events.

Bar and Catering Development

We are continuing to work with Mark and his team to develop the range of menus.

During the summers Peter, Fergal and the team have presented a range of new dishes, including:

Lobster (Thermador and Nurenburg)

Chinese Beef with onions, sweet chilli noodles

Italian Buffalo, mozzarella and ham

Chicken Chorizo

These have proven highly popular and with autumn and winter coming, we look forward to more tasty menus.

The Club Wine List is under constant review by the Wine Committee, which meets at regular intervals to taste and identify wines of character, which represent good value for money. Since the beginning of this year, three changes have been made to the List and others are pending.

The Wine Committee is also responsible for organising the Wine Appreciation events, which are planned for the Winter Programme. The first of these, on Tuesday 6th November, will feature a tasting of wines from a specific region covering prices across the spectrum.

In spite of the impact of poor weather, with many Thursday Evening Races being cancelled, Mark and his team have delivered financial results that exceed the budget; a true reflection to on their hard work.

Members Needs and Expectations

The understanding of member's needs and tastes are critical to our efforts to continually improve the catering and bar services and we are trying to establish ways of getting continuous feedback and achieve ongoing improvement. Please do not hesitate to talk to Mark or myself.

Staff changes

Refuse from Members Boats

Refuse disposal costs us in excess of £3,000 a year. It would help considerably to keep down our costs if Members took their refuse home for disposal. Please do not dispose of hazardous waste, e.g. batteries, oil, oily rags, etc in the bins as that is outside the terms of our waste disposal contract.

Business Lunches

Article 34 does not prohibit a member from entertaining a business acquaintance in the Club, but only to prevent the carrying out of business within the Clubhouse. Briefcases and other business impedimenta may be left with Reception or the Steward.

Membership

The Club welcomes new members and the best source of new Members is the recommendation of existing Members. If you have friends who sail and who would make active Members, please ask the office to send a 'welcome pack'. There is no waiting list for Membership. If necessary the office can advise on the requirements for proposers and seconders and for those who are unable to indentify a proposer or seconder, Provisional Membership has been introduced which can be held for a year; within which period the candidate is required to identify a proposer and seconder to support his application for full membership.

Training Courses

There is a NEW training page on the website which has details of the training courses offered by the Club. You can secure a place by paying the fee at reception and you will find that our course fees are considerably less than those charged at a commercial training centre.

Volunteers

We could not run our sailing programme without our dedicated volunteers; but we need more, new faces are always welcome. There is a role to suit everyone. In particular, we need more people to help with computing race results and race officers. Training is given. Please contact Anna George if you would like to get involved. Hand delivery of Club mailings saves a substantial sum of money. Can you help by delivering envelopes to Members

who live near you? If so please contact the office.

Tickets for Functions

If you order tickets for a function and cannot attend please let the Office know as soon as possible. Arrangements for refunds are:

Turkey and Goose Christmas Dinners, Christmas Party, New Year's Eve and New Year's Day: No refunds for cancellations less than 7 days before the function, unless the tickets are resold. All other functions: No refunds for cancellations less than 2 days before the function, unless the tickets are resold.

Club Lottery

Members are encouraged to join the Club Lottery. The proceeds have helped the Club to buy the binoculars in the Bar, the electronic projector for lectures and recently the magazine table for the first floor landing. Cash prizes range from £200 to £75, a meal for two in the Club, or bottles of wine. Tickets cost £2 per month each and you can hold more than one ticket. More details from the Office.

Menus

The Club must run the only restaurant in the area where the menu can range from a cheese sandwich to a Beef Wellington in the same sitting, and then turn its hand to a formal dinner later the same day. On Fridays and Saturdays throughout the year the bar is now open all afternoon, and a range of hot and cold snacks is available, and don't forget coffee mornings on the first Wednesday of the month, with Peter's mouth-watering home-made scones. Permits for Defaced Ensigns

Members holding a Permit to fly a defaced ensign will know that registration under either Part 1 of the Merchant Shipping Act or on the Small Ships Register is a prerequisite. Permits are now issued only for the unexpired period of registration, rather than indefinitely as has been the case. When registration has been renewed, the office can issue a new permit for the life of the new registration. Permit holders are requested to check that the validity of their Permit does not exceed that of the boat's registration. Members are particularly asked to note and comply with the guidance notes regarding defaced ensigns given in

Winter Dress

Members are reminded that after 1900 smart casual dress is required in the dining room. Members or their guests who are inappropriately dressed for the dining room can use the river room. Members are also reminded that young children are not permitted in the dining room after 2000.

RYA Community Award for John Bence

John Bence has been a lifelong sailor. He first became involved in

the organisation of sailing with the Sigma 38 Class, of which he became Chairman.

In 1999 John was elected as a Member of the General Committee of the Royal Lymington Yacht Club. The following year he was elected the Club's Rear Commodore Sailing. Apart from the usual responsibilities of the role, John was closely associated with a number of significant community sailing initiatives. He helped to broker the eventual agreement whereby Merrill-Lynch provided a major grant to Lymington Sailability. John also concluded that agreement under which Yacht Havens Ltd have for the last five years contributed substantial financial support to our Wednesday Junior Sailing Community sailing programme. As a Member also of the Lymington Town

Sailing Club, John did much to foster improved relationships between the two Clubs and with Salterns SC, the local children's sailing club.

John was nominated by the Lymington clubs for election to RYA Council representing Clubs in the Southern Region. Following his unopposed election, John, with the support of his wife, Jennifer, was assiduous in visiting other clubs so as to be best able to represent their views, and in attending Southern Region meetings. With the reorganisation of Lymington Harbour Commissioners under Trust Ports legislation, John was appointed to Lymington Harbour Advisory Group representing leisure interests, and was elected Chairman. He has been assiduous in supporting the interests of users, especially the sailing and rowing clubs, particularly in relation to increased controls on sailing proposed by the Commissioners, and the proposed larger Wightlink ferries.

The current healthy state of the sport of sailing across the community in the Western Solent and around the Lymington River owes much to the vision, commitment and energy of John Bence. His efforts richly deserve recognition by an RYA Community Award for Lifetime Commitment



Geoff's trimaran, Freethinker, is shown in the photograph on his way past the Club's starting platform. Paralysed from the chest down and confined to a wheelchair, ex-professional yachtsman Geoff is the holder of many disabled sailing endurance records and the Personal Everest Challenge will be exactly that. Geoff is a former chairman of the Trustees of RYA Sailability, one of the Club's two officially supported charities.

Lymington was Geoff's first port of call in May after having to postpone his start due to a capsize and a period of atrocious weather. Geoff and his support team spent two nights at the Club as our guests and our Vice Commodore hosted a supper for them with guests from Lymington Sailability. We provided space for his Land Rover and two motor homes in which his family and support crew slept, and we provided electricity, water, showers etc.

RACING NEWS

The Club has had an exceptional year so far in International Regattas.

In Portugal at Cascais recently, in the ISAF 2007 Sailing World Championships, Pippa Wilson with Sarah Ayton and Sarah Webb were the winning Gold Medal crew in the Yngling class. Nick Rogers with Joe Glanfield came 8th in the same regatta in the 470 Class.

Sophie Weguelin and Sophie Ainsworth won Silver in the 29er class at the 2007 Volvo Youth Sailing ISAF World Championship in Kingston Ontario, Canada.

Ben Paton, came 2nd (in a fleet of 235) in the Laser Radial Class at the Laser Grand Prix at Hyeres, he then won in Warnemunde Germany sailing in a Laser Radial Europa Cup event against 139 other boats, and most recently he has just won Gold in the Laser Radial World and European Championships!



Pippa Wilson, Nick Rogers and Ben Ainslie were selected for the pre-Olympic Regatta in Qingdao, China; Ben Anslie took the Gold Medal in the Finn Class; Nick Rodgers and Joe Glanfield, won Silver in the 470 Class and Team GBR scored 5 Golds and 1 Silver.

Congratulations to Jonny Moss (Fishers Green S.C) and Ben Muskett who won the Silver medal at the 420 Junior European Championships in Medemblik, Holland. They finished 3rd Overall, and second European boat, in a highly competitive International fleet of 116 boats representing 19 nations.

Meanwhile, as if to prove the longevity of sailing as a sport, Stuart Jardine won the J24 class in Bermuda earlier this year.

Locally, the XODs won the team racing in Cowes.

Jasmine Husband with her helm Claire Walsh were 1st female crew in both the Spanish and French 420 nationals, and then won a Gold medal in the Open Ladies 420 Europeans in Istanbul





sailing a Nordic Folkboat in IRC 9. In fact the first 3 boats in IRC 9 were Folkboats, the winner being Ed Donald in Madelaine, who sails in the Lymington fleet and he was only a fraction of a point away from winning the entire Black Division at Cowes. Ed had earlier won the Gold Roman Bowl in this years RTI race. The overall winner of Folkboat Week was *Crackerjack* sailed by Stuart and Caroline Watson and Matthew Jones with *Tak* sailed by Jeremy Austin, Stuart Jardine and Bill Dunson in second place. A good year for the local Nordic Folkboats.

Jane Pitt Pitts won the Lymington River Scows Nationals.

On the off-shore IRC front, JEBA, a First 40.7 has been having a busy RORC racing season, representing the Club in the Myth of Malham race, the Round Eddystone Race and the Morgan Cup. Owner John Nicholas report can be
