

REFLECTIONS OF THE VICE-COMMODORE

It is hard to believe that three years have gone by since I was elected your Vice-Commodore. It has been a busy period and much has happened. As I sit here with the Christmas festivities still a pleasant memory, it seemed a good idea to reflect back over the last three years.

First thought is don't do the job unless there is some fun in it. That has worked out for me and I can genuinely say that I have enjoyed my time. It has enabled me to meet many more members than otherwise would have been the case, and to consider aspects of the Club's activities where I might not have been involved.

The Club seems to me to be in good shape both financially and in spirit and it is pleasing to be able to say that. Nothing is so destructive to a club than deep-rooted divisions and very often such divisions have financial origins or impacts. In my view and within limits the stronger the balance sheet the easier it is to make good decisions. Fortunately we are of one company and I hope will continue to be so.

Right now we have no crisis or problem with membership numbers. The provisional membership scheme has been

very successful bringing in some 50 active boating members. Membership numbers have held up pretty well but it always gets more difficult.

Membership will always be an active issue for the Club. As a members club we restrict membership to active boaters and of course agreeable people. We genuinely welcome young members and children but recognise that employment prospects in our area are limited; typically, after University the younger members move away. On the other hand it is a very popular retirement area, particularly for people who like boating. Each year we lose some 120 to 180 members through mobility, death and old age, giving us a target recruitment of some 12 new members each month to stay where we are. To put this into perspective, a net loss of 25 full members over a year approaches 1% of subscriptions. We all therefore have to be conscious of the need to attract new members. In short, it is our Club and it is financed by our subscriptions. That's a long-winded way of saying please do what you can to bring in suitable new members because if we don't our subs will go up!

Finally let me thank you for your support during my term of office, thank the staff for their help and hard work and wish the new officers success and enjoyment of their time.

CRUISING

CRUISING LOG COMPETITION

The Club has a wealth of well documented information on the sort of cruising many of our more adventurous members enjoy. This mine of experience is kept in the Chartroom in the form of Cruising Logs indexed and filed on the shelves in box files for all to read. We plan one day to put the indexing on computer and perhaps on the web to make access easier.

The Log Competition was conceived, I believe, to encourage members to write accounts of their voyages to enable our valuable collection to be continuously updated and expanded. Recently the number of Logs written for the archives has fallen, which is a great pity and the CSC has debated why this should be.

The suggestion has been made that the term 'Log' may, in some peoples mind, suggest a document similar to that legally required on merchant vessels and RN ships and as such dissuade some from attempting it. Now, whilst a formal log would be an excellent record and of value to the club, a narrative log written in any style and format illustrated or not and with any detail you found worth recording is also going to be of value to the club.

Items of interest might include:-

Type of yacht, length of cruise, weather conditions, strength of crew, time constraints, navigation and pilotage details, track chart, ports, marinas, fuel, food shops, restaurants and airports for crew changes, weather forecasts. The list could go on but perhaps the best of helpful information is your views on things, that you learnt and that you would or would not do next time. If you have photos to include or diagrams to illustrate the log so much the better. Easy really and you can show it to the great grandchildren one day as well as, maybe, winning a prize! And while you are at it could you put it onto a CD so that we can have it digitally recorded and hence stored electronically and perhaps put on the club web site one day.

To encourage more members to write logs perhaps we should change the title from Cruising Log, to reflect the less formal requirements. Cruise Notes? Account of Cruise? Cruise Journal? It would be nice to revive the great tradition of sharing knowledge between members so what do you think, change the name - if so to what? Please let me know.

From the Harbour Master

Time has flown by since I left my role as Wightlink's Operations Director to take up the combined role of Harbour Master/Chief Executive for the Lymington Harbour Commissioners (LHC) at the beginning of July.

Since joining, I have been particularly struck by the very warm welcome I have received from those of you I have met, both from Officers of the two Clubs, and river users – thank you.

My early months have been taken up with getting to know the business, and undertaking a review of our compliance with the requirements of the Port Marine Safety Code – the guidance by which we should be managing the safety of all marine activities within the river to recommended standards. In this respect we have made some adjustments as to how we do things and have identified some further areas for improvement which will be progressed over the coming months.

Staying on the theme of safety, it is important to remember that while the LHC through the Harbour Master has the statutory responsibility and authority to maintain safety (through regulation and byelaws where necessary), it is important that all users recognise their responsibilities and work together to ensure risks are minimised. Your continued support in this regard is much appreciated.

So what about a snapshot of the future? Well, many of you will already be aware of the risks to the harbour posed by the rapidly eroding salt marsh. We are continuing to develop our plans for the construction of a breakwater that will safeguard the Harbour (and therefore many of the moorings available) going forward. Further environmental studies will be conducted over the winter and into spring 2007. Shortly thereafter we will apply to the regulators for the consents to construct.

Many of you reading this article will have had to wait very many years for a mooring, and many of you will still be waiting. The list is currently at a record level with around 700 persons waiting for a mooring. I am somewhere near the bottom! One of our challenges will be to see where we can develop or improve our existing moorings to ensure we are better placed to respond to the demand, and particularly to tailor the moorings available to the changing trends in boat ownership.

We also need to give some thought on how we can make Lymington more attractive to visitors to stem the gradual decline/stagnation we have seen in recent years. To this end, I have already taken the opportunity to 'accost' some visitors to get their views. As a start, for the 2007 season we will be opening up part of the outside of the new Dan Bran pontoon for organised rally's/regattas consisting of six boats or more. This will available on an advance booking only basis, something that we have not offered before. Early interest has been encouraging.

At the same time as progressing the above, we need to continue to ensure that we can preserve and where possible enhance the unique character and environment that we are all so privileged to enjoy.

Finally, my team and I will not forget that we are here to promote the safe enjoyment of the river by all users. To this end, please drop in, or flag us down on the river if you have any matters that you would like to bring to our attention. Good sailing!
